





The Adventures of Tympie Nuchus By Ross H. Hier



Pieces of the Prairie



Breadroot Scurfpea (Psoralea esculenta): This unique member of the pea family goes by many common names. The Lakota name for it is Timpsila; some other common names include Prairie Turnip, Indian Breadroot, Scurfpea, and Tipsin. A cool season forb, it was likely the most important plant harvested and used by the nomadic Plains tribes that hunted Buffalo. Its versatility for food uses made it indispensable for those people. The Lakota even called the month of June "Timpsila" itkahca wi"; "Moon when Timpsila is ripe". The prized part of the plant is the tuber ($\sim 2 \frac{1}{2}$ inches in length and 1 inch wide). The tuber is generally 3-4 inches below the surface and was removed with a distinctive, long probing stick (Lewis and Clark describe this activity and one can find old photos of Native women harvesting tubers). After removing the "husk" the white tubers could be boiled, fried or dried for later use. Once dried they kept very well and could be pounded into a flour for thickening soups, making tallow/meat breads, etc.. Lewis and Clark called them "white apples" while French traders referred to them as "pomme blanche" or "pommes des terres" (ground apples). Lewis and Clark noted the Plains Grizzly dug and fed on these tubers very heavily. Typically found on drier, hillside prairies, they flower in May and June. After seed formation, the stem near ground level "breaks-off" and driven by prairie winds, the drying plant tumbles across the prairie to disperse its seeds.
