

The Society welcomes some new MPCS Life Members; thank-you for your tremendous support of prairie habitats and prairie chickens.



# **MPCS Member News**



### MPCS Loses A Longtime Member

Longtime member and conservation-minded Allen T. Torpet of Fertile, Minnesota passed away on November 1, 2022 at the age of 88. He was born in the same house his father was born in outside of Fertile in Garfield Township. An avid fisherman and hunter, Allen met his wife, Elaine, while on a duck hunting trip in Saskatchewan. He carried rural mail for nearly 3 decades in the Fertile area and always had an idea of what was going on in the natural world in the region. He knew much history of the area. He loved prairie chickens and their habitats; often watching from local viewing blinds in his younger years. He had hunted deer for over 70 years. His distinctive brogue and wry humor were a welcome trademark to any that met him. He often joked that his family had come 15,000 miles from Torpet, Norway only to miss settling on the good land by 15 miles (referring to the then inhospitable Red River Valley). He always had black Labradors and raised beef cattle for many years. A close friend of the Editor's and many others on the Board, he will be missed.





**Deathcamas:** Sometimes called Showy Deathcamas, (*Zigadenus* <u>elegans</u>) hails from the Lily family. It is a striking cool season (Spring) perennial growing anywhere from 10-30 inches in height when flowering. Above ground vegetation comes from a deeply buried "onionlike" bulb. DO NOT consume any parts of this early season beauty as all members of the genus contain toxic alkaloids. It is particularly toxic to domestic sheep. It is a common plant on the prairies of the upper Midwest; typically growing in moist prairies. As is the case with so many plants in the Lily family, the dried seed pods are just as beautiful and identifiable as a plant with fresh flowers.
