



Spirit Lake Dakota Pictographs and Ties to Prairie Chickens By Jim Uhrinak



Prairie chicken researcher Dr. John Toepfer lived among the Spirit Lake Dakota in Benson County, North Dakota during part of his illustrious career. He had interest in what tribal people knew about prairie chickens and what might be learned from traditional ecological knowledge (TEK). The Dakota were part of the seven-fire *Oceti Sakowin* that encompassed the Oglala division of the Teton fire.

Images No. 71 and No. 72 shown above are from Wall-Dog and Hand's Oglalapersonal-name pictoral roster of family heads under Chief Big Road obtained by Rev. S. D. Hinman at Standing Rock Agency, Dakota in 1883 from the United States Indian agent, Major McLaughlin. Only four of the eighty-four images are of "women who are depicted as the surviving heads of families." The image No. 71, personal-male-name pictograph is translated *Prairie-chicken* and image No. 72 is translated *Red-Flute-Woman*. An object connected by a line to the head or mouth indicated the name of the person. However, gestures and other marks could convey additional information.

These images were excerpted from my 1886 military-review copy of the 1884 "Fourth Annual Report of the Bureau of Ethnology to the Secretary of the Smithsonian Institution 1882-1883 by J. W. Powell, Director," pages 174-175.

Although Dr. Toepfer could not distinguish prairie chicken or sharp-tail from this pictograph, it definitely shows that someone had one or the other on their mind.

Pieces of the Prairie

Jack-in-the-pulpit (*Arisaema triphyllum*) typically flowers from April to June in our part of the state. It often flowers a year after a fire runs through a prairie thicket of brush or aspen. It is pollinated by species of Fungus gnats which are attracted to the odor the plant creates. It is a strange plant because of its ability to be a male plant, a plant of both sexes and/or a female plant (Jill-in-the-pulpit). This is typically determined by the plant's size (smaller plants almost always being male). Plants contain oxalic acid and are poisonous if the plant is consumed in a raw state. Indigenous people did use the plants in various ways after boiling the corms. It served as a treatment for sore eyes, bronchitis and snake bites. It was reported that it was also used as a poison against enemy tribes (corms in raw state were chopped -up and mixed with meat and left purposely for enemies to find and consume.)
